What is the "Promise" Offering?

"But this I say: He who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and he who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. So let each one give as he purposes in his heart, not grudgingly or of necessity; for God loves a cheerful giver."

2 Corinthians 9:6, 7

"Promise" is a name used for regular and systematic offering (different from spontaneous offerings), in which:

- It is considered as important and binding as tithe (Malachi 3:8–10).
- The system is proportional (percentage-based).
- · It is given as a percentage or proportion of the income (Deuteronomy 16:17; 1 Corinthians 16:1).
- The worshipper chooses the percentage of the income that will be regularly given "Promise" (any percentage is valid).
- The regularity of giving is determined by the regularity of the blessing which is received (the income).
- It should be given after any income (Proverbs 3:9).
- It is not expected when there is no income (2 Corinthians 8:12).
- The worshipper offers it immediately after the tithe, and before any other expense is met or giving is done (Proverbs 3:9; Matthew 6:33).
- Regularity, percentage, and period of validity must be previously "vowed," "promised," or "purposed" by the worshipper (2 Corinthians 9:7)

Comparing Tithe, Promise, and Special Offerings

"Will a man rob God? Yet you have robbed Me! But you say, "In what way have we robbed You?" In tithes and offerings. You are cursed with a curse, for you have robbed Me, even this whole nation. Bring all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be food in My house, and try Me no win this,' says the Lord of hosts, 'If I will not open for you the windows of heaven and pour out for you such blessing that there will not be room enough to receive it." (Malachi 3:8–10)

In Malachi 3:8–10, tithes and offerings are clearly placed under the same system. This implicitly suggests at least three similar characteristics for both tithes and offerings: (1) regularity (according to the income), (2) proportionality (a proportion of any income), and (3) delivery (brought to the storehouse).

Ellen G. White also agrees that tithes and offerings are under the same system. She alludes to the fact that this system includes the concept of also giving offerings as a proportion of the income: "In the Bible system [singular word] of tithes and offerings [both under the same system] the amounts paid by different persons will of course vary greatly, since they are proportioned to the income (*Counsels on Stewardship*. 73).

In another quotation, she says that this offering along with the tithe, is not spontaneous or voluntary but is part "of our obligation." This thought is in line with Malachi 3:8–10, which states that not bringing that offering is viewed by God as dishonesty. She writes: "This matter of giving is not left to impulse. God has given us definite instructions in regard to it. He has specified tithes and offerings as the measure of our obligation. And He desires us to give regularly and systematically (*Counsels on Stewardship*, p. 80).

Combined Offering Plan


USED IN THE SPD'S ISLAND FIELDS

There are three different offering plans used within the worldwide Seventh-day Adventist Church.

The Combined Offering Plan was voted as an option in at the Annual Council of 2002 after a recommendation by the World Stewardship Summit of 2001.

It supports all levels of the church by putting total funds collected into one pool.

The funds are distributed according to a formula approved by each division but within the following percentages: 50 percent for the local church; 20 percent to



the General Conference for mission funds, 10% for the Local Union and 20% for the Local Mission for mission expansion work in the local field. Divisions making use of this plan currently include: ECD, ESD, IAD, NSD, SAD, SID, SPD (Island Fields), SSD, SUD, WAD.

Personal Giving Plan

The Personal Giving Plan is an optional guide for members. It organises the financial needs of the church into three categories (roughly the same three categories covered by the Combined Offering Plan) and offers a suggested percentage of the member's income to be dedicated to each category. They are:

- Local Church Budget (3-5%). This would include utilities, maintenance, insurance, school operating expenses, children's magazines, teaching supplies, staff salaries, bulletins.
- 2. Local Conference Offerings (1-2%) for Christian education, local evangelism, Vacation Bible School, summer camps, union magazines, etc.
- 3. World Budget (1-3%) to support the global mission needs of the church as promoted in the approved Calendar of Offerings. Sabbath School offerings are received and treated the same way as in the Calendar of Offerings plan. This plan also makes provision for giving toward special projects.



A Simple Guide to the Offering Devotional Videos

The Offertory Devotional Readings you have in hand gave origin to the Offertory Devotional Videos. These two-minute educational and motivational videos are planned to be presented every Sabbath in your church, before the offering collection.

You may play or download the two-minute videos (for this and previous years) by using the QR code below. The following are instructions on how to use them:

- The videos are to be presented in the church before the offering collection.
- They do not include the appeal or the final prayer, which should be supplied by the person scheduled to promote the offerings.
- The videos may (and should) also be shared through social media or during congresses, youth programs, small group meetings, camp meetings, church boards, Stewardship Weeks of Prayer, etc.
- The videos were recorded in English, but each division or union is permitted to translate them into their various languages or customise them with regional accents.
- The entire video with original soundtrack no voiceover/no letterings will also be available, upon request, to divisions and unions at no charge from the GC Stewardship Ministries Department.
- Local church pastors and stewardship ministries directors must be informed about the videos and how
 to down-load them and share them in their churches, especially before the offering collection.

He has specified tithes and offerings as the measure of our obligation, and he desires us to give regularly and systematically. After the tithe is set apart, gifts and offerings should be apportioned, 'as God hath prospered you"—The Review & Herald, May 9, 1893.


Is it still relevant today?

Yes, more than ever, and here's why. All mission activities, from

local church outreach to massive, nationwide evangelism initiatives, are made possible through your mission offerings. However, while local church offerings have been growing, mission offerings have been declining.

As the graph shows, in 1930, for every \$10 that North American Adventists returned in tithe, they gave an additional \$6.45 (64.5% of tithe) to mission offerings. By 2008, that number had dropped to just 36 cents (3.6% of tithe), which is almost 18 times less than in the 1930s.

The data for places like
Australia and New Zealand is
only slightly better with mission
offerings in 2021 equating to 4.8%
of tithe¹, which is still less than
half-a-percent of our personal
incomes being given to God's
mission. As you can imagine,
this severely limits the resources
available for fulfilling the Great





world.

Giving systematically and sacrificially, out of our comfort zones, requires a leap of faith. How can we show God that we love Him more than earthly comforts? How can we exercise a greater faith in our Provider God and take that leap? One key way is by taking God at His word when He says, "Test me in this" (Malachi 3:10 NIV). God wants us to test Him, to try His promises and watch Him bless our lives as we faithfully return a full tithe and offerings to His storehouse.

After returning God's 10 per cent tithe to Him, systematic givers set aside a specific percentage of their income for God's offerings. For some people this might three, five, even 10 per cent or more. The key biblical principle for calculating offerings for God is that we are to give 'as God has prospered' us. (1 Cor. 16:2; 2 Cor. 8:1-15)

Let's welcome back Sister Betsy into our mission offerings planning. By carefully setting aside a prayerfully decided percentage of our income for

offerings, together we can provide all the resources needed for God's frontline mission work at home and around the world.

Ready to take your leap of faith?

Here's three simple steps to help you set up your Personal Giving Plan.

Step One: Prayerfully consider your current finances and ask God to guide you to give a percentage of your income/increase to the Sabbath School, Church and other Mission offerings each week.

Step Two: To avoid sporadic or simply emotional giving, set up a system so that your offerings to Godby cash, eGiving or other meansare planned and systematic across the whole year, 'as God has prospered you'.

Jesus saves. I spend.

Was Jesus a saver or a spender? He was the epitome of generosity—a big giver—but the Bible doesn't have any references to Him being a big spender, even though He had 24/7 access to the resources of the universe!

Even when He 'showed off' His unlimited wealth by generously creating a meal for 5,000+ people out of thin air, He still wasn't wasteful. He asked His disciples to collect the leftovers—not just the whole loaves and whole fish, but every last "fragment." And what was His reason?

"... so that nothing is wasted." John 6:12 (NLT)

Did you see that? Jesus saved twelve baskets of scraps immediately after proving that He could instantaneously provide so much food that wasting twelve *thousand* baskets wouldn't have been an issue.

How easy it is, when God has blessed us abundantly, day after day, year after year, to start to be wasteful or overspend in some areas of our lives—often without even knowing it.

We often spend, spend on our homes, transport, holidays, recreation and overall lifestyles.

Jesus saves. Shouldn't we save, too?

Appeal: As you return God's tithe and give your Promise offerings today, you can partner with Jesus in His saving of people. Let's ask God for forgiveness for the times that we have wasted our blessings on useless things and ask Him for help to give as He gives and to save as He saves.

Larry's Lions

The Bible tells us that Satan is *the* master of deception. He makes poisons taste delicious and even lets some people make healthy food taste terrible! He makes truth look like error, and error look like truth, and now the whole world is confused.

His offer of satisfaction through worldly success, thousands of social media followers, or the ability to earn or travel more than your friends is nothing more than a cruel counterfeit for the *true* peace and *true* satisfaction that Jesus offers.

The story is told of two men, Larry and Bill, who lost their jobs and couldn't find any work. Bill saw an advertisement from a zoo paying \$5,000 per animal for captured lions. It was a dangerous career indeed, but they decided to try and capture some wild lions.

Off they went into lion country with an innocent lamb, a homemade cage, and a computer spreadsheet showing all their financial goals. As they scrambled across a rocky ledge, it broke, and they slid down into a steep-walled pit full of hungry lions. Larry quickly assessed their situation and cried out, "Bill, we're rich! We're rich!"

Don't be deceived. Satan walks around like a roaring lion, looking for someone to devour (1 Peter 5:5-8).

Appeal: As we think about God's protection and the blessings that He so bountifully gives us, may it inspire us to be faithful in returning His tithe and giving our Promise offerings to Him. And may we always seek for, and find, the true satisfaction that only God can provide us with. Thank you for your faithful giving today.

The Rule of Tens

Have you heard about The Rule of Tens? It's based on some ancient financial advice, and it is still practised by many people around the world today. Using this Rule of Tens system has allowed some families to manage their money wisely and to find financial freedom.

It works like this: When God gives you income, the very first payments should go to the three categories of 'tens.'

10% for God's tithe: This is an act of loyalty and faithfulness, of gratitude. It is a recognition that all you have comes from God and that the first 10% is actually already His, so you faithfully return it to Him.

10% as offerings: This 10% is given as Promise offerings, donations, and gifts. It shows that you recognise God's gifts and that it is more blessed to give than to receive.

10% for savings: This is a gift to yourself and your family so that you can be better prepared for future needs that might arise. The Bible teaches us the importance of saving to better care for our family in hard times.

In Malachi 3, God challenges us to test Him by faithfully returning the 10% tithe and giving a percentage amount that you can choose to Promise offerings. True financial freedom comes through our returning tithe to God, giving to others, saving wisely, and spending carefully.

Appeal: Are you giving your first and your best to the Master? God invites all His children to be regular and systematic in their giving. The Bible teaches that those who put God first will be rewarded for their faithfulness. Thank you for giving generously to God's work today.

Local Church Budget

Use Things. Love People.

As we prepare to return our tithe and give our offerings today, remember this wise saying, "In an age that loves things and uses people, Christians are called to love people and use things."

Jesus showed us how to do this. He *used* mud to *love* a blind man. He *used* sand to *love* an adulteress. He *used* water and clay pots to *love* some newly-weds. He *used* loaves and fish to *love* a crowd of hungry people. He *used* his garment to *love* a bleeding woman.

And finally, He used a cross and three nails to build a bridge, that of love.

Jesus used things to love people.

But, in a Divine twist of amazing multiplication, Jesus also *uses* the people He loves. He *uses* us to *love* others—to love everyone—even our enemies, the people who have unjustly *used* us.

As His stewards, God invites us to use our things to love people. We should use our time, talents, treasures, and testimony to lead people to Jesus. What a privilege it is to be co-workers in God's vineyard.

Appeal: Do you *love* God enough to be *used* by Him? As you return your 10% tithe and give your Promise offerings today, ask yourself how you can *use* things—your home, finances, talents, and time—to *love* people. It's a beautiful way of living. It's God's way. Thank you for your faithful giving today.



Disaster and Famine Relief (ADRA)

Two humanitarian workers talked late into the night, every night, in Kathmandu, Nepal. They just wanted to catch up after years apart, but they also didn't really want to sleep, knowing that earthquake aftershocks through the night could rock their already damaged hotel.

Simon and Julian had spent years in Nepal doing humanitarian work with the Adventist Development & Relief Agency. Just 48 hours after a massive earthquake struck—killing nearly 9,000 people and injuring over 22,000—they were called back to Nepal to assist in ADRA's emergency response.

With decades of trusted experience, ADRA is often among the first on the ground when disaster strikes—whether in Nepal, Haiti, the Philippines, Sudan, or right in your own country. But even with years of training and experience, the emotional toll is heavy.

That night in Nepal, Julian felt overwhelmed by the suffering all around them and confessed how helpless he felt. He turned to Simon for wisdom. Simon replied:

"Julian, when we realise we can't help every person in need, we need to do for one what we wish we could do for everyone."

Do you wish you could help everyone affected by disasters, famines, and conflicts around the world? You can't do it alone—none of us can. But you can do for *one* what you wish you could do for *all*.

Appeal: The Seventh-day Adventist Church's system of tithes and offerings is a powerful way for us to unite in God's worldwide mission. Alone, our gifts may not seem like much—but together, we are changing lives around the globe.

Do You Have Nothing or Everything?

The disciples must have asked Jesus, "Are you sure, Lord? Do you really want us to go out empty-handed? No gold or silver, not even coppers? No bag and no spare clothes? What, not even a pair of sandals?!"

A few years later, Peter and John, filled with the Holy Spirit, were walking to the temple when a lame man begged for some coins. Peter's response, despite having no money in his purse, demonstrates his faith and trust in God. Peter said:

"Silver and gold I do not have, but what I do have I give you: In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, rise up and walk." (Acts 3:6)

The man jumped up and leapt around, praising God! What a miracle!

In the padded-pew affluence of the 21st century, we can no longer honestly say, "Silver and gold have I none" because we do have some money. However, today, we find it hard to say, "In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, rise up and walk."

Have our finances stolen our faith?

Peter's purse was full of nothing/everything ... and he used it to buy a miracle.

Appeal: As we now return God's 10% as tithe and give our Promise offerings, let's ask God to break the bonds of whatever limits our faith. Let's pray that God will help us experience the mighty work He can and wants to do, whether our purse is empty or full. Thank you for your faithful giving today.

Today, we find it hard to say, "In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, rise up and walk." Have our finances stolen our faith?

A Force-field of Faith

In 1915, a lady named Ellen G. White passed away. She had spoken and written about health, education, theology, family, devotional life, prayer, and leadership for seventy years.

Her writings are now available in more than 175 languages—more than any other American author. She wrote 5,000 articles and 40 books and left behind more than 100,000 handwritten pages.

Some people say that one of her most powerful paragraphs is the one below. When fully understood, it covers our entire life, including our faith and our finances.

"The Father's presence encircled Christ, and nothing befell Him but that which infinite love permitted for the blessing of the world. Here was His source of comfort, and it is for us. He who is imbued with the Spirit of Christ abides in Christ. The blow that is aimed at him falls upon the Saviour, who surrounds him with His presence. Whatever comes to him comes from Christ. He has no need to resist evil, for Christ is his defence. Nothing can touch him except by our Lord's permission, and "all things" that are permitted "work together for good to them that love God." (Ellen G White, *Thoughts from the Mount of Blessings*, p. 71)

What an incredible promise! When walking with Christ, any blow that the enemy aims at us falls on Jesus first, and He only lets through to us those challenges that will work together for our good.

Our life is in God's hands; what an awesome place to be!

Appeal: As we now return God's tithe and give our regular and systematic Promise offerings, let's do it with a joyful and grateful heart. Jesus is our Protector and our Provider. When walking 'in Christ' and with Christ's Spirit in us, we have nothing to fear—for our faith or finances. Thank you for your faithful giving today.

Local Church Budget

Giving Up, Blood Pressure Down

Jesus said, "Give, and you will receive. Your gift will return to you in full—pressed down, shaken together to make room for more, running over, and poured into your lap. The amount you give will determine the amount you get back." Luke 6:38

For at least two thousand years, the words "It is more blessed to give than to receive" have been on the lips of preachers—and fundraisers!—but we know it's true. Something wonderful happens inside us when we go against our instinctively self-centred human nature.

Researchers around the globe have identified generous giving as a key to increasing happiness. However, could generosity include more benefits than just nice feelings? Researchers at the University of British Columbia put it to the test.

Every week, they gave patients with high blood pressure two \$20 notes and guided them on how to spend them. Half of the patients were told to spend the money on themselves, so they purchased clothes, massages, face creams, and other self-focused gifts.

The other patients were told to spend the money on others. They bought muffins for fire-fighters, cookies for neighbours, gifts for their grandchildren, and donated to charities.

The result? The self-spenders had no change in their blood pressure, while the gift-givers 'showed a significant reduction in blood pressure.' Giving is a blessing.

Maybe future doctors will simply write, "Be generous twice a week until blood pressure returns to normal."

Appeal: It truly is "more blessed to give than to receive." God has blessed the Seventh-day Adventist Church with a system of giving that is a great blessing to us and others. It's now time to return God's tithe and give our Promise offerings joyfully. Let's thank God for the beautiful privilege of giving.



Adventist World Radio

Imagine if your outreach methods had no walls, borders, or limits to stop them from reaching billions of people. Adventist World Radio's broadcasts travel across the airwaves to places where missionaries cannot go, transforming lives for eternity.

Appeal: As we now return God's 10% tithe and give our regular and systematic Promise offerings, let's ask God to reveal the things that might be drawing us away from completely trusting Him. Let's live wisely and always remember and act on the belief that Jesus is always enough. Thank you for your faithful giving today.

Protecting His Fingerprints

Presidents, Prime Ministers, and politicians encourage us to care for the environment—but shouldn't Christians be exempt?

The Bible clearly and repeatedly tells us that this old world will soon 'pass away' and that 'Earth 2.0' (the new and final version) will take its place. Surely, that must mean that we can care less about the environment.

Heinz, Kraft, Wrigley, Hershey & Colgate

Tithing is the Biblical system of returning 10% of your 'increase,' such as profits, wages, and salary, to God's storehouse. It is clearly requested by God in the Bible, but is still a somewhat controversial topic across Christianity.

Some who argue that tithing was only for the Jews and that today, we are called to give our 'all' for God often end up returning far less than 10% to Him. In comparison, other Christians meticulously return an exact 10% tithe—even on the estimated value of gifts they receive—but have little interest in caring for the poor or refugees or showing mercy to others.

Jesus Himself said we should do both—return an honest tithe *and* actively uphold justice, mercy, and faith (Matthew 23:23). And God told Moses that 'all the tithe of the land ...is holy to the Lord.' (Leviticus 27:30, 34)

From years of 'testing' God, as instructed in Malachi 3:8-12, millions of Seventh-day Adventists have become firm believers in tithing. Maybe you have also heard of the families from the business world whose surnames are now the famous brands Heinz, Kraft, Wrigley, Hershey, and Colgate. Did you know that they were all faithful tithers?

Jesus encourages us to return a faithful tithe to God so that the everlasting gospel can be preached far and wide to hasten Jesus' soon return.

Let's ask ourselves this important question today: Are my tithes in proportion to my blessings?

Appeal: As we now return 10% of our increase to God as tithe and give our regular and systematic Promise offerings, let's ask God to reveal to us if we have left out anything essential in our tithe calculations. Then, let's step out in faith and follow His word in our giving. Thank you for your faithful giving today.

Dying to Our Self

Six thousand years ago, Satan tempted Eve to think of her **self** before God. She did.

Four thousand years later, Satan tempted Jesus in the wilderness with the same offer on a different contract—look out for Your**self**. He didn't.

For three years, Satan tempted Jesus to put Himself first. Just once. But He never did. Not once.

Weeks pass. Prophecy's unmovable deadline approaches. Satan's getting wildly desperate. He has Jesus flogged, tortured, spat on, and forsaken by all, but Christ remains sinless and selfless.

Satan nails Him to a cross and lifts Him high for the final attack. If he can plant a tiny seed of **self**-preservation in Christ's torture-hazed mind, the victory will be his. Demons enter religious leaders, soldiers, and the criminal alongside as they hurl a hellfire of temptation at Him, "IF you are the Son of God, save Your **self**." He still doesn't.

Jesus! Defend Your **self**! Prove Your **self**! It was the frantic heart cry of every disciple, of every weeping soul at the foot of the cross (and of Satan!).

Finally, the Jewish leaders unknowingly speak a profound truth, "He cannot save Himself."

Jesus could not save Himself—and us—so He chose us. Today He invites us to find our self, and crucify it.

A Volkswagen car advertisement reads, "Every so often, you realise you're worth a bit more, and the things you once found extravagant become altogether necessary. Because once we get a taste of a better life, there's no going back."

What an incredible insight into human nature. We continually want more and better and nicer things, even though it may cause others to have less or distract us from our God-given mission.

Are the people who humbly follow Jesus of Nazareth and believe that they have an incredible eternity awaiting them called to upgrade their lifestyles at the same rate as people who don't know God? Are we also to seek satisfaction and worth from the nice things we own?

The Bible clearly teaches that we can be conservative in our living so that we can be liberal in our giving. Maybe God allows us to be 'worth a bit more' so that we can upgrade our standard of *giving*, not just our standard of *living*.

Maybe it is time for us to have an upgrade—of our giving.

Appeal: Your regular and systematic offerings, called Promise, are your partnership with God. For with the same measure that you use, it will be measured back to you" (Luke 6:38, NKJV). If you doubt this promise, test God. Prove Him, and you will see for yourself.

Often, when we decide to give to a good cause, the question arises, "How much can I afford to give but still have enough for my future?" It's an excellent question that should be asked. However, our answers are often guided too much by worries about tomorrow, so our gifts often shrink from relatively 'generous' to 'safe,' or even worse.

God's promises remind us of some universal principles of giving, and they are as sure as gravity.

In Proverbs, we read, "One gives freely, yet grows all the richer; another withholds what he should give, and only suffers want. Whoever brings blessing will be enriched, and one who waters will himself be watered." (*Proverbs* 11:24-25) That's a promise from our Father.

Jesus tells us, "Do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about its own things," and He promises, "Give, and it will be given to you. Good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap." (Matthew 6:34; Luke 6:38)

Our Father is the Great Provider. He gives us food, clothing, shelter, work, strength, education, and so much more. Let's be about our Father's business. Let's live and give by faith, and let God prove His promises for both today and tomorrow.

Appeal: As we now return God's tithe and give the Promise offerings, which we are encouraged to pre-plan and set aside as a percentage of our income, let's also ask God to fulfil His promises to care for our needs. Let's thank Him for all His provisions and ask forgiveness for the times when we have held back offerings to try to feel more secure.

These T's are all things that God entrusts to us to be used carefully and prayerfully and for His glory. Paul said it beautifully, "Whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31).






Keep the Faith

Imagine that you're in Rome in the year 65 A.D. The Apostle Paul is imprisoned, awaiting his approaching execution.

For decades, Paul has ministered to both the rich and the poor—and he has experienced both situations himself. He's watched professing followers of Jesus use God's gifts to glorify themselves instead of the Giver. He's watched them exalt *human* genius, revere *worldly* success, desire *earthly* luxuries and teach their children to do the same. Yet he's also witnessed heart conversions, mind-blowing generosity and incredible sacrifice.

He's felt guilt for not always following the example of Jesus, who, being rich became poor for our sake, that we, through His poverty, might become rich—eternally.

A decade earlier, Paul had an epiphany. He saw right through everything offered by the world, and he realised that his greatest possible satisfaction, his highest privilege, his very reason for existing, was to lift up Jesus Christ.

With death approaching, Paul writes to young Timothy. It's a dying man's last letter, crowded with wisdom, fatherly advice, and earnest pleading. He concludes, "Timothy, I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith" (2 Timothy 4:7).

That's also Paul's prayer for us. In all our life decisions, he encourages us to 'keep the faith.'

Appeal: It's now time to return God's tithe and give the Promise offerings, which we are encouraged to pre-plan and set aside as a percentage of our income this week. Let's ask God to help us to hold on tightly to Him. Let's reflect God's faithfulness in our returning of tithe and giving of offerings. Let's keep the faith.

World Mission Budget Offering

Before we collect the tithe and offerings today, I want to share with you some of the ways that offerings are invested for God's kingdom. You may be surprised to learn that, besides supporting the mission of your local church and regional missionary initiatives, your offerings help support the work overseen by 324 missionary families worldwide.

When your offering is distributed as suggested by the Combined Offering Plan, 20% of your total offering supports the World Mission Fund. Resources from this fund are distributed through the General Conference to world divisions, unions, and fields, helping build and sustain frontline mission work in those regions. While our tithes help provide salaries of missionaries, our offerings help fund all other missionary needs locally, regionally, and internationally.

Did you know that your church can only operate if it is funded by offerings? Offerings can also supply the needs of buildings and equipment that missionaries need to carry out their work.

Various institutions and agencies that serve the world church are also helped through offerings. They were an anomaly to my young, ambitious, profit-driven mind—a husband-and-wife team who ran their businesses for God.

Over the years, I studied their financial reports and even helped to structure their network of companies, trusts, and foundations to maximise gifts to charities and ministries. The process allowed me to uncover their deepest values, firmly rooted in 2 Corinthians 8:9, and challenge my heart's motivations.

They came from an era when wealthy Christians didn't flaunt their blessings. They believed that every cent they owned was God's and was reserved solely for His glory, never their own.

They could have lived a luxurious lifestyle, but lived frugally, yet comfortably, on far less than the average household income. They made any evidence of their wealth almost invisible.

On observing the husband making yet another unnecessarily frugal decision, when the selection of the upgraded option could have made their life much more comfortable, I asked the question, "Dad, why don't you and Mum spend more on yourselves? Why not enjoy more of life's luxuries?"

Two decades later, his simple yet life-changing answer is still ringing in my ears, "Charity is our luxury."

Man cannot show greater weakness than by allowing men to ascribe to him the honour for gifts that are Heaven-bestowed."

Let's find rest and peace today in the joy of giving full credit where it is always due—to God our Creator, Sustainer, and Redeemer.

The names of Latimer and Ridley are tied together in history because they were tied to the same stake to be burned as martyrs on October 16, 1555. On the evening before Ridley's execution, a friend offered to stay by his side all night to comfort him, but Ridley politely declined his offer, saying, "God willing, I plan to sleep as quietly tonight as ever I did in my life."

How could Ridley have such peace when he was about to lose literally everything on earth, including his life? And why are some rich, healthy people so stressed while some of the poorest enjoy deep peace?

As we get more life experience, we begin to understand that peace is not the absence of problems; it's the presence of God. Ultimately, true peace doesn't rely on *externals* but *internals*.

Perfect health is not required.

Great wealth is not required.

Fairy-tale relationships are not required.

We find peace when we find God. As Paul wrote in Philippians 4:6-7, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

Are you looking for peace? Look for God first, and you'll sleep well.

So, let's hear that wise saying again, "Do your giving while you're living, so you're knowing where it's going."

Appeal: As we now return God's tithe and give our Promise offerings, let's remember that God is the Owner of everything and that, while we are living every day, He invites us to be faithful stewards of all His gifts. Let's "Do our giving while we're living, so we're knowing where it's going." Thank you for your faithfulness.

Famous authors are often quoted, but we rarely hear from their spouses. An exception is James White, the husband of the world's most translated female author, Ellen G. White.

James was also a writer, teacher, and preacher who left us a legacy of wisdom, including this simple but powerful statement about the art of giving:

"Giving is a trade, to be learned just as well as any other trade" (Review and Herald, Feb. 17, 1903).

One thing we can learn by listening to people's stories about their charitable giving is that money is often easier to make than to give away wisely. Wise and cheerful giving certainly is an art and a trade that must be learned because the skill doesn't come naturally.

Many regular givers have felt the sting of donating to a cause that looked legitimate but later proved to be a waste. Let's treat our giving as a God-quided trade as we seek to faithfully and cheerfully manage His resources.

- "God's ways are the best ways always."



And it is to support them that the Church has the Annual Sacrifice Fund. If your territory has adopted the Combined Offering Plan, a portion of your regular and systematic offerings will be allocated to this fund. In addition to that, once a year, members around the world are invited to sacrifice another portion of their income, besides their tithe and Promise Offering, and send that portion to this fund.

Just as God has called these Global Mission pioneers to give up so much to serve Him, He calls us to sacrifice too—even if we remain at home.

Appeal: This is one of the ways we may sacrifice and unite in God's worldwide mission. Alone, our gifts may not go far—but together, we are transforming lives across the globe. As you return your tithe and your regular, systematic offerings—you can be sure that God is using your gifts to change lives for eternity. Thank you.

God's Megaphone

Like Noah, Elijah, and John the Baptist, Seventh-day Adventists have been assigned one of the most exciting missions ever. We are the forerunners—those appointed to announce the soon-coming King. And what's our cry? In its purest form, the Three Angels' Messages of Revelation 14 loudly proclaim, "The greatest rescue event in the history of our planet is soon to take place. Be ready!"

The original Greek words describing the 'loud voice' with which these messages are given are basically a megaphone. That's us, God's *megaphone* of love!

Old, Poor & Alone

He was surviving the pains of old age, living on a meagre income alone in government housing. He'd read a book on stewardship and wanted me, the author, to visit with him. The only reason he gave me why I should visit was, "I just want to tell you something."

I delayed the visit because I knew in my heart that he'd just ask me for money, but I arranged an appointment anyway, secretly hoping that he wouldn't be home.

After chatting about his old furniture and how he budgets every coin into separate containers to try to pay his bills, he got to the point. He began, "I just want you to know how much your book about material blessings challenged me."

"Really?" I said. I was surprised that a book on affluence, written for wealthy Christians, would have had any impact on a poor old man living alone.

"Yes. I've always returned a 10% tithe to God, but a few years ago, I set a goal to give a regular second 10% of my income for mission projects, and I recently reached that goal. But while reading your book, God convinced me to give a third ten per cent for mission. I just wanted to let you know that I'm nearly at 30%, and God is blessing me so much!"

The tears of joy in his eyes reflected the tears of conviction in mine. He's not old, poor, and alone. He's looking forward to his new pain-free body, rich in the Lord and truly part of God's family.

As I walked back to my car, I asked God to forgive me for hesitating to visit him, for judging his heart by his circumstances, and for being too selfish with the material blessings God had given to me.

Appeal: As we now return God's 10% tithe and give our Promise offerings, let's each consider how God is convicting us to prayerfully and systematically set aside a greater percentage of our income for His mission of saving the lost.


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
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

Colombian drug dealer Pablo Escobar was the leader of a cartel that controlled up to 80 per cent of the world's cocaine sales. His brother Roberto was one of the cartel's accountants and author of the book Escobar: *The Untold Story of the World's Most Powerful Criminal*. In the book, Roberto reveals, "Pablo was earning so much that each year we'd write off ten per cent of the money because rats would eat it in storage or it would be damaged by water or lost." Some sources claim that Escobar's annual ten per cent 'tithe-for-the-rats' was more than a billion dollars!

Jesus once said, "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth where moth and rust destroy." I think Jesus might have known a few greedy people in His day. Luke 12:13-21 tells Jesus' parable of the rich fool, and it's not pretty:

Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me." Jesus replied, "Man, who appointed me a judge or arbiter between you?" Then Jesus said to them, "Watch out!"

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
